Who Are We?

The New Zealand Utilities Advisory Group (NZUAG) Inc. is a not-for-profit, joint consultative group of road and rail owners and utility operators working together to create outcomes to benefit all road users and communities. The NZUAG is the guardian of the National Code of Practice for Utility Operators' Access to Transport Corridors (the Code), under the industry governance model preferred by Government.

Through its Board, NZUAG is responsible for the administration and effective implementation of the Code.

NZUAG provides information and support on issues relating to utility operators' access to road and rail corridors, including access to the Code, assistance on its interpretation, education and awareness, downloadable resources, news and events.

The Code

The National Code of Practice is Secondary Legislation under the Utilities Access Act 2010, and so is mandatory for all parties. As such it applies to the activities of all road and rail corridor managers and utility operators throughout New Zealand.

The Code regulates the management of Utility Operators' access to transport corridors, recognizing that the ability of utilities to get in and out of the corridor as efficiently as possible to install, maintain and upgrade network infrastructure is critical to New Zealand's economy and overall quality of life.

Becoming a Member of NZUAG

NZUAG has two types of membership: Full and Associate. Full membership is divided into the three categories: Corridor Managers, Utility Operators, and Contractors and other Industry Bodies, with any other organisations and interested individuals able to become associate members.
